Digging Deeper

In 2 Corinthians 8.9, we read, “For you know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though He was rich, yet for your sake He became poor, so that you through His poverty might become rich.”

1. To get a glimpse of how Jesus was “rich,” and the full extent of how He became “poor,” meditate on Philippians 2.5-8:

Have this attitude in yourselves which was also in Christ Jesus, who, although He existed in the form of God, did not regard equality with God a thing to be grasped, but emptied Himself, taking the form of a bond-servant, and being made in the likeness of men. Being found in appearance as a man, He humbled Himself by becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross.

Although it’s impossible for us to begin to grasp, imagine what it was like for Jesus to exist *eternally* in absolute holiness, and give it all up to become a helpless baby, and grow up to face the cross.
